Parsha Summary

Ki Teitzei · When You Go Forth

Deuteronomy 21:10-25:19

This lengthy parashah contains the final collection of laws in Deuteronomy, a miscellany dealing with private concerns. Here are laws dealing with the individual and the family, communities, and neighbors, as opposed to matters of state or public authority.

The parashah begins with three family laws: Laws limiting the prerogatives of a man who captures a woman in warfare; establishing the rights of a firstborn child in a polygamous family; and discussing the punishment of a ben sorer u-moreh (a stubborn and rebellious son).

Given that the body reflects the Divine image, the Torah mandates respectful treatment for the corpse of an executed criminal.

Chapter 22 presents a series of laws: On returning lost animals and lost property; assisting a fallen animal; maintaining gender distinction in dress; treatment of a mother bird and her eggs; and building a parapet on the roof. Laws follow prohibiting sowing mixed seeds in a single field, plowing with an ox and ass, and wearing clothing made of *shaat-nez* (linen and wool). Four-cornered garments require tzitzit (tassels).

A series of laws about sexual misconduct deals with premarital sex, adultery, and rape. Chapter 23 continues the theme with a listing of forbidden relationships, then shifts to a discussion of who may or may not enter into God's assembly.

The remaining laws span a range of topics: The sanctity of the camp, asylum for escaped slaves, and cultic prostitution. Lending on interest is prohibited, and the fulfillment of vows is mandated. One is allowed to eat in another person's vineyard.

Chapter 24 continues this eclectic listing, forbidding remarriage to an ex-spouse if she remarried in the interim. A man is allowed to postpone military service if newly married. There are laws on kidnapping, skin affliction, taking property to compel repayment of a defaulted loan, and prompt payment of wages.

Passion for God requires passion for justice, for "everyone who deals dishonestly is abhorrent to Adonai your God." The parashah ends with the ultimate symbol of dishonest, cruel treatment – that of Amalek, who "cut down the stragglers in your rear." Israel is commanded, therefore, to blot out Amalek's memory.


