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Setting Our Spiritual Watches to Jewish Time: The Torah Begins Again

One of my favorite features on my watch is World Time. It is an application which allows you to set your watch to two different time zones.

As a result, whenever I look at my watch, I can see what time it is in Chicago and in Jerusalem. I like to think of the Central Standard Time as the setting for my body, and Jewish Standard time for my soul. My Chicago clock helps me keep my daily schedule. Like many of you, I find myself constantly looking at my watch trying to figure out how to keep track of everything that is jammed into the day. But when I see the Jerusalem

time on my watch, it reminds me that I have a soul as well. Just thinking of that special and holy place encourages me to open my eyes to the beauty of the world and to all that I have for which to be grateful. When Shabbat arrives, I find myself naturally switching over to Jerusalem time. A period for my soul, where I can put some of the issues that have occupied my mind aside for a day.

Recently, I have noticed that one of my greatest places of respite is Torah study. In the world in which we live, we are inundated with words, with messages, with questions, or encouragement to go here, purchase that, think this, and reject that. It is exhausting. With things coming so quickly at us it also makes it hard to actually reflect and develop a considered opinion. For me, this is one of allures of Torah study. We have the opportunity each week to turn everything else off, open the parasha, and be transported to a different universe where we read a story, a narrative, a set of laws, and just reflect on its message. The remarkable thing about reading archetypal stories is that they are so applicable to our everyday lives. For example:


- How should we think about our relationship to the creation?
- What does the flood story have to teach us today?

- What can we learn about families from our Patriarchs and Matriarchs?
- What makes for a just society?

As the holidays come to an end, we will begin the year anew, and the Torah cycle along with it. I invite you to set your spiritual watch and make time for your soul. You don't really need the app; we Jews come hardwired with it already installed. Allow Shabbat to become part of your life in whatever way you find meaningful. In addition, we do have a number of ways for you to study the portion of the week. There are classes during the week that are warm, welcoming and informative. They are also recorded on Zoom so you can watch them at your leisure. You can also tune into our Shabbat morning service where one of our Rabbis will always be talking about the Parsha in a relevant and meaningful way. I, along with Rabbis Russo and Chankin-Gould, look forward to engaging with you during the course of this year with our Jewish texts. Just set your watch to Jerusalem, or Jewish Standard Time, and we will meet you there!
