# Parsha Summary

Noach · Noach

Genesis 6:9 - 11:32

God turns to the one righteous person on earth, Noah, and instructs him to build an ark of gopher wood in which to save his family and representatives of every species of every land-dwelling animal. God also tells Noah to store away enough vegetables to feed him and the animals in the ark. Foretelling the institution of Temple sacrifice and kashrut, the Jewish dietary laws, Noah takes seven of each tahor (ritually permissible) species, and only two each from the tamei, the ritually impermissible. He gathers this menagerie into the ark. Then for forty days and forty nights, it rains without letup, submerging even the highest mountains under the deluge. The waters cover the earth for 150 days, and then begin to recede as the ark settles on the summit of Mount Ararat. For three more months, the waters continue to diminish; at the end of forty days, Noah opens the window, sends out a raven, then a dove that is unable to find enough dry land to rest. After another seven days, Noah sends the dove out again. This time it returns clutching an olive branch. After yet another seven days, the dove flies out and never returns. God instructs Noah and his family to replenish life on land. As his first act after the flood, Noah builds an altar and sacrifices every kind of tahor animal. God is pleased with the offering, pledging, "Never again will I doom the earth because of humanity, since the devisings of the human mind are evil from their youth." As a sign of that covenantal promise, God sets the rainbow in the sky. In recognition of human nature God makes animals fear humans, and permits eating meat, provided that the blood is separated from the meat (as is still performed during kosher meat preparation). Noah's three sons, Ham, Shem, and Japheth, emerge with him from the ark. Noah becomes a vintner and gets drunk. His son, Ham, sees his father's nakedness, which his other sons cover without looking. As a result of this incident, Ham (Canaan) is cursed; Shem, ancestor of the Semites, is blessed; and Japheth is made large.

Amidst tracing the record of the descendants of Noah through his three sons, the Torah recounts how a uniform humanity attempts to build a tower to make a name for itself. God responds to this arrogant overreaching by dividing and multiplying the languages of humanity and by scattering humanity over the face of the whole earth. The parashah ends by tracing Shem's descendants through Terah to Avram and Sarai.



**When 10 or more people subscribe, Joey will host a FREE custom workshop for our group!**


