## Parsha Summary Yitro • Jethro Exodus 18:1 - 20:26

We remember those of our Anshe Emet family who are no longer with us and whose Yahrzeits we observe this week.

May their memory be for a blessing.

Jethro, the father-in-law of Moses, hears the miracle of Israel's liberation, and he brings Moses's wife, Zipporah, and their two sons, Gershom and Eliezer, to the Israelites' encampment. Moses goes out to greet his family, escorts them into his tent, and recounts the many wonders that God performed against Pharaoh for the sake of the Israelites. In joy, Jethro blesses God and offers a burnt offering, joined by Aaron and the elders.

The next morning, Moses works as judge for the people from early morning until late at night. Jethro is horrified, telling Moses that this seeming act of kindness is actually an imposition on the people, and that he will wear himself out. Jethro organizes a hierarchy of judges, culminating in Moses as Chief Judge, thus allowing the people to have access to justice and Moses to rest. Once Moses establishes this judicial order, Jethro bids him farewell and returns home.

Three months after the Exodus, the Israelites arrive at the wilderness of Sinai. God offers a special covenant confirming the unique relationship between God and the Jewish people: "If you will obey Me faithfully and keep My covenant, you shall be My treasured possession among all the peoples."

When Moses reports this offer to the people, they respond in unison, "All that Adonai has spoken, we will do!" For three days the Israelites purify themselves. On the morning of the third day, they hear thunder and lightning, see a dense cloud on the mountain, and hear a loud blast of the shofar. Moses ascends to the mountaintop as God descends. God tells Moses to return to the people, and when he and they are together, God speaks the words of the Ten Commandments.

1. I am Adonai your God.

- 2. Worship no idolatrous images.
- 3. Do not swear falsely by the name of God.
- 4. Remember the Sabbath and keep it holy.
- 5. Honor your father and mother.
- 6. You shall not murder.
- 7. You shall not commit adultery.
- 8. You shall not steal.
- 9. You shall not bear false witness.
- 10. You shall not covet.

The people are so awed by this revelation that they ask Moses to intercede and record the rest of God's word while they remain at a distance. God concludes by prohibiting idolatry, establishing animal sacrifice in "the place where I cause My name to be mentioned," and prohibiting the use of hewn stones in the altar.




