

The Need to Publicize the Miracle of Chanukah in Our Age

There is something wonderful about kindling

the lights of the Chanukiah. Chanting the blessings and watching the candle for the night ignite from the flame of the Shamash amidst the unmistakable aroma of latkes, are all part of the joy of our eight day Festival of Lights. Of course, this being a Jewish holiday, there are also rules for its observance. According to the Rabbis:

- Each of the eight candles are traditionally on the same level to remind us that there is no day of the holiday that is more important than the others.
- The candles are lit with a Shamash, a helper candle, to underscore the idea that the single purpose of the light is Pirsum Hanes, the publicizing of a miracle in the time of the Maccabees, as well as the wonder of the Jewish people in our day.
- While the candles are burning, we avail ourselves of their light in celebration of a victory of the few over the many, and when Jewish faith and bravery won the day.

One tradition that you may not be familiar with is that, according to the Rabbis, the way to fulfill the Mitzvah of Pirsum Hanes is by ensuring that the Chanukiah can be seen by those outside your home. In the ancient world, Jews would place the Chanukiah outside of their homes to proclaim the miracle of the festival to the passersby on the street. That would include placing the Chanukiah in the windows of our home for all the world to see. Sadly, during our history, we also see Rabbis advising their communities to light the candles behind drawn curtains during times of heightened anti-Semitism.

When I originally wrote this article, it was before October 7 and the terrible pogrom that took the lives of nearly 1400 Israelis. My focus at the time was on the growing cancer of anti-Semitism in America. In a world where Jews are being made to feel marginalized, I advised to embrace the notion of pirsum hanes, the outward publicizing the miracle by placing a Chanukiah in your window as a statement of outwardly embracing our Jewish identity in the face of those who stand against us.

The world is a very different place after October 7. None of us could have predicted how quickly, vociferously, and effectively the anti-Israel groups around the world would be in pushing their message. Israel has been maligned around the world as a colonialist apartheid state that does not deserve to exist, much less defend itself. We see it everywhere, especially on college campuses. Our young people who attempt to stand with Israel, or express concern for family or loved ones there, are seeing a level of hatred brought against them, which their parents have never experienced.

This year, I want to encourage us to consider the Rabbis' dictum and place our Chanukiot in our windows with blue and white candles to proclaim to the world, as the letters of the dreidel indicate. a great miracle happened there in the time of the Maccabees, and that of the modern State of Israel in our own day. However, the Rabbis also said that in a time of danger, or heightened anti-Semitism, one was not responsible to place the Chanukiah in their window. This may be especially relevant to those on college campuses. Typing these words, it is hard for me to comprehend that I am writing them in the United States of America in 2023!

But that is our reality, and I leave the decision of where to place your Chanukiah to each of you.

In 167 B.C.E. a war was fought against those who wanted the Jewish people to disappear. Under the leadership of Judah Maccabee we fought and defeated our foes. When Jews began to return to the land of Israel, they saw themselves as modern Maccabees. Our prayer is that we will be victorious in our day just as they were against the Assyrians.

- Just as they created a secured Jewish country, so shall we.
- Just as they had the courage to kindle the light of the Menorah and that of Jewish identity, so shall we.

Each morning Jews pray: Or Hadash Al Zion Tair: May a New Light Shine on Zion. May there be a new light shining over Israel, and for all those who live there. We ask for God's blessing of a true Chag Urim Sameach: a holiday of light and joy. Am Yisrael Chai!

Many of you may be aware that my mom

has lived with us since about a year after my dad died. It was a decision born from a number of factors, but that is not why I share this with you. What I love most about my mom is her passion for living as full a life as possible, and her fearlessness. Over the past few years, she has taken time to reconnect with many friends from childhood. Some of these friends - and family - she hadn't spoken to for many years. About a year ago, we were able to find the name and address of my parents' friend, Junior. To give you some context, in all of the stories my parents told me about growing up in the Bronx, none of them were without mention of their friend Junior. He wasn't Jewish, but certainly had a Jewish heart. He was my dad's best friend - they considered themselves brothers. All the tales of fun and craziness, well into their twenties, were of Mom, Dad, and Junior. Unfortunately, as often happens, life intervenes with even the closest of friendships, and without the miracle of the Internet even on the horizon, my parents lost touch with Junior.

When I was finally able to track down his phone number. I watched my mom's face as we dialed. She had feelings of trepidation, just like when she reconnected with others. Would he be happy to hear from me after all of these years? Would he remember me? Would it be too awkward?

He answered - and after much amazement and crying on both sides - these two people reconnected. Junior and my mom talk most every week now. They have shared all the highs and lows that happened during the time they were out of touch. In October, between what would have been my dad's 82nd birthday, and my mom's 82nd birthday (they were 8 days apart), my mom travelled to San Francisco to visit with Junior and his partner. My mom cannot stop speaking of it - and my heart is filled with joy knowing that my mom and Junior will get to spend important time together. At the same time though, my heart breaks knowing that my dad will not get to see his friend again - and Junior has said that he is so sad and misses my dad terribly.

All of this comes into sharp clarity as I reflect on what it means to build community and create relationships. We do not know what will come and what the future holds. The most important thing that we can do as people, as individuals - as humans - is to reach out to each other.

To take the step forward and make that call, even if it seems like a long shot. If we wait, the moment and opportunity may pass. If we don't wait and take the chance that our long-lost friend or family member will be on the other side of the line, we may discover, or rediscover, a friendship that is more beautiful than we remember.

After the holidays, it is easy for us to step back into routine and put off, or put aside, connecting with our Jewish community of Anshe Emet. Maybe we do it because of work, because of kid's activities, because we are nervous we won't

know people. The beauty of our community, however, is that we offer hundreds of ways to connect with each other, be it through Shabbat services, lectures, or social events.

There are two events that I want to highlight for you. The first is the "We Are Here" concert on November 6. This event is a reprise of the Carnegie Hall concert highlighting songs from the Shoah. Our very own Rabbi Michael Siegel, and Cantor Rachel Brook will be part of this special event. The second event is our annual Kaplan concert, co-chaired this year by Tracy and Howard Ankin. This year, we will feature the Shul Sisters, with our very own Cantor Brook, on November 12. This special event should not be miss. Of course, if these are not your cup of tea, there are other ways to lean into Anshe Emet.

This year, as we enter the winter months -Thanksgiving, Chanukah – take a page from my mom. Pick up the phone, write that email, and connect with your friends, including those that maybe you haven't seen or talked to in a while. Then, invite them to join you at one of Anshe Emet's multitude of offerings so you can have something planned on the calendar. I promisem, you won't regret taking that step closer to your friend, and closer to Anshe Emet.

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Honoring Our Heritage Focused On Our Future



Judith Hausler Duckler was born in Israel in 1946 (Interestingly, her birth certificate does not list a country of birth, but rather "Jerusalem"). She immigrated to the United States with her family at the age of 11. Her father, Dr. Ephraim Hausler, was a Hebrew teacher at Anshe Emet Day School and later became Educational Director at Anshe Emet. Judi's mother, Lotte Hausler, was also a Hebrew teacher. Judi and her brother became b'nai mitzvah at Anshe Emet: "Uncle Ben" (Ben Aronin) was their teacher. In 1967, she married Harold Duckler at Anshe Emet in a large wedding officiated by Rabbi Seymour Cohen and Cantor Moses Silverman. Judi has remained a lifelong member of Anshe Emet. She and Harold live in Edgewater.

Her Anshe Moment describes her entry into Anshe Emet Day School upon arrival in the United States:

My parents left Europe to go to Israel before World War II; my father was from Germany, my mother from Poland. After the war, they toured Europe to find relatives but sadly, no one had survived. During this period, we lived in Germany, England, Switzerland, France, and Belgium. My father's friend, Hans Erman, worked at Anshe Emet as a Hebrew teacher. He wrote to my father and invited him to bring our family to America.

When we arrived, my father was immediately hired by Anshe Emet and my younger brother Jay and I started at Anshe Emet Day School. I was put in the 6th grade and my brother started 1st grade. I was immediately moved to the eighth grade because my education in Europe was extensive and I was more suited to a higher grade. I spoke Hebrew, German, and English, and my mathematics background was more akin to high school math at that time. We also started attending Anshe Emet Synagogue on Friday night, Shabbat morning, and Hebrew school to help us get integrated into the American mainstream.

My first days at school were a bit challenging: Although I spoke English, it was British English—not American English—and I spoke that English with a heavy-duty accent. I dressed in short skirts as was the style in Europe at that time and here all the girls were wearing saddle shoes and longer skirts.

On my first day, everyone asked, "Who's that?" and "Where's she from?" I introduced myself as Judith Hausler from Israel, but was immediately identified as "Dr. Hausler, the Hebrew teacher's, daughter." Unfortunately, from then on, I was known to everyone as merely "Dr. Hausler's daughter," not Judith, Judi, or even Yehudit. This went on for years. Finally, I had a good friend who was a jeweler make me two necklaces, one in English (Judith) and one in Hebrew (Yehudit). From then on, I would point to these necklaces and say, "this is who I am." Dr. Hausler is my father, but I am Judith.

Little by little, though, I became used to American customs and became integrated into the community. I later taught kindergarten at Anshe Emet Day School. I am still very involved in Anshe Emet and attend each Shabbat—it is an integral part of my life.

Movie Night: Farewell Mr. Haffmann Link Available November 14 & 15





Gabriella Boros Artist & AES Member

Gabriella Boros was born in Jerusalem, Israel to Holocaust survivors. Her family immigrated to the U.S. for her father's career when she was voung.

A graduate of the University of Michigan School of Art, Gabriella has exhibited her woodblock prints both nationally and internationally since 1986. She has completed three artist residencies and is a recipient of a State of Illinois Artist Grant. She has been chosen to participate in two fellowships: the Spertus Museum's Midwest Artist Lab and the Amen Institute's Artist Week Her work is included in both private and institution collections. Her three handmade books Esh: Sanctity in Fire, and Symbiosis and Eighteen Stones, are in the permanent collection of the University of Michigan Libraries Special Collections.

Her themes include the intersection of plants and humans, and gender and cultural commentary, sometimes, all in the same work.

Gabriella's relationship with Anshe Emet goes back to 1992 when she was on the board of Central Synagogue and found out it was in bankruptcy. As a young twenty something, she resigned immediately and joined the largest, most active conservative synagogue in Chicago, Anshe Emet.

Her art studio was around the corner, and she would come worship on Saturdays before spending the day painting. Gabi met husband Eric Bergson at a Young Adult Division Shabbat service, and her entire life changed. Even after leaving the city for Skokie, Gabi and her family never stopped belonging to Anshe Emet. They both love the worship service, the amazing clergy (including a long roster of wonderful rabbis trained by Rabbi Siegel) and most of all, the congregants. Their best friends come from the synagogue!

Na'aseh is Social Justice at Anshe Emet

Thousands of migrants/asylum-seekers have flooded into Chicago in the last year; they continue to arrive on a daily basis. Approximately 1,000 of them are housed at the American Islamic Center (AIC) located at Irving Park and Marine Drive. Another 150+ are temporarily housed at the 19th Police District on Addison Street. Many are Venezuelan and many are here with their families. They traveled thousands of miles to arrive in Chicago and have arrived with little beyond their lives and the clothes on their backs.

In the spirit of tikkun olam and welcoming our new neighbors, Anshe Emet Synagogue (AES), as a community, is planning several initiatives to support these individuals. We recently completed a coat drive. Many thanks to all who contributed.

We are also launching a mentorship program. Our vision for the mentorship program is founded upon the positive experience gained by members of the AES community while mentoring immigrants from Burma, Sudan, and Afghanistan. We will hold an information session soon. If you would like to learn more about mentoring a family, please contact naaseh.ansheemet@gmail.com.

In addition to direct service, we seek to address systemic change. We advocate, partnering with HIAS and JCUA, to remind our elected leaders that the Jewish experience is the refugee story. We urge our leaders to advance policies that protect refugees and asylum-seekers. With dedicated, consistent work we have and can achieve big wins at the state level. This work is ongoing. Want to get involved in advocating for systems change? JCUA's immigration committee offers training and social events to educate ourselves, and opportunities to take action.
