Century of Progress: Jewish Day Pageant

The greatest Jewish show ever staged

in Chicago took place on Monday evening, July 3, 1933, at Soldier Field, before more than 125,000 people. Sponsored by the Jewish Agency for Palestine, The Romance of A People was the culminating event of Jewish Day at A Century of Progress of the World's Fair held along Chicago's lakefront. To add to the luster of the evening, the most famous Zionist of that time, Chaim Weizmann, addressed the audience. The next day, under a frontpage headline, 125,000 Witness Jewish Spectacle, Chicago Tribune reporter James O'Donnel Bennett wrote: One hundred and twenty-five thousand men, women and children of Chicagoland's Jewry unrolled on Soldier Field last night a gigantic scroll emblematic of the resounding Pentateuch, and thereon they read the story, now tragic, now triumphant, of their race's march down forty centuries to the new Palestine of today.

What strikes me about this unprecedented event was the audacity of the Jewish community to put it on at this moment. This was the same year that the Nazi Party came to power in Germany. The concern for the German Jewish community was so great that Weizmann asked that \$100,000 be raised in his honor to help move as many Jews out from the grip of the Third Reich to Palestine. The antisemitism, which was one of the foundations of Hitler's victory, did not register a concern outside of the Jewish community. In addition, Jews were feeling under attack in this country. Father Coughlin's Sunday night radio program was laced with anti-semitic vitriol and yet remained one of the most popular shows in the country. At a moment in American history when there were those who advised the Jewish community to maintain a low profile, a sha shtil attitude, the Jews of Chicago stood tall that evening, proudly portraying their history and dreaming aloud of a Jewish homeland. At the center of it all was Anshe Emet and its Rabbi.

This summer will be 90 years since the Jewish community staged The Romance of A People as part of the Chicago World's Fair. Much has changed over the years. The Holocaust went well beyond the worst fears of Jews in 1933. The State of Israel was established in 1948 and the American Jewish community has become the strongest in the history of our diaspora. But, as I write these words, Israel is at war after suffering its worst attack in its 75 year history and, unbelievably, anti-Zionism and anti-semitism are at an all time high.

We have been witness to congressional hearings on why great universities in this country have allowed Jewish students to feel threatened on campus and in classrooms for their Zionistic beliefs.



- We have been witness to many around the world focusing their attention on Israel's response to a violent and inhuman pogrom, rather than on the actions of Hamas.
- We have been witness to women's groups openly ignoring gender based crimes by Hamas on October 7th and those held hostage.

In the 150th year of our congregation, we have something to learn from our synagogue's past. We must not remain silent nor cower in fear. We must make the best use of Jewish organizations, such as the Jewish United Fund of Metropolitan Chicago, the Anti-Defamation League, and the American Jewish Committee to name a few. We must reach out to our elected officials and consider the manner in which they represent our interests as we cast our votes. We must demand that our college campuses be safe spaces for Jewish students just as we would speak up for any other group.

The powerful story of the Jewish people that was portrayed in The Romance of a People is in our hands today. We do not need to hold a spectacle at Soldier Field to portray it. Rather, we need only to employ the passion of our Jewish hearts, and the power of our voices, to celebrate it in our age and into the future.

A Message from Our Board President

The Power of Tzedakah

Right now, as I write this letter, we are in the middle of Chanukah, contemplating the meaning of this holiday in light of the horrific terror of October 7th, the ongoing crisis for our hostages, and the continuous war being waged between Israel and Hamas. At Anshe Emet, the clergy and staff have been working overtime to do everything possible to support us all - whether that is in the guise of Frozen Shabbat, individual counseling, bringing in speakers, holding challah baking events, or simply supporting us all being in community with each other. This, to be honest, has not been easy. We are a large and diverse community with a wide range of views. What I do know, however, is that in one way or another, every single person has been impacted by what is going on in Israel and Gaza. The loss of life and suffering is beyond imagination. The healing that will be required, and the skills professionals will need to lean into are not even known. We see the alarming rise in anti-semitism and at times, at least for me. I feel stuck and without words, my heart shattering and I find myself asking: where do we go from here?

It is during these moments that I am brought back to where we were a few years ago, during COVID. We were dealing with something we had never seen. In my work (community health care, for those that do

not know), we were trying to balance the safety of our staff with our commitment to our patients and communities. This all happened under the backdrop of extreme unrest that was especially hard for our patients and staff, because many live and work in the areas hardest hit in the city - the south and west sides. It was hard to know what to do moment to moment. Things were changing rapidly. A close friend and colleague shared these words of how she was finding strength. She asked herself every day, "How can I be of service today?" This question is the one that I ask myself when I feel stuck and observing a world that barrages us with messages and images that make us feel helpless.

At Anshe Emet, our Na'aseh (Social Justice) Committee has created many opportunities to give back to the Chicago community. You can support refugees moving to Chicago, make and serve meals with the Night Ministry, fight hunger with the JUF Uptown Café, or Nourishing Hope (food pantry). We collect items to support other organizations like Mercaz Nediv Lev Giving Center and, starting in December, will be supporting the needs of newly arrived migrants through a sponsored Legal Clinic. This group, led for many years by Samantha DeKoven, does good every day. I encourage everyone to check

out some of the opportunities to serve with Na'aseh on our Anshe Emet website, including a link to the JUF TOV Calendar. While participating in the opportunities created by Na'aseh are important for making connections to each other, I want to encourage each of you to consider a new, increased, or additional gift to our sustaining fund. At a time when anti-semitism and acts of anti-semitism are at an all-time high, our costs for security have increased significantly, as we aim to create as safe an environment as possible. Your gift now will help defray these costs and also support the additional programs and staffing that we have felt is needed to give everyone in our community a chance to come together in solidarity with our larger Jewish community.

A friend sent me this quote by Rabbi Jonathan Sacks z"l - "There always were two ways to live in a world that is often dark and full of tears. We can curse the darkness, or we can light a light, and as the Chassidim say, a little light drives out much darkness. May we all help light up the world."

With prayers and hopes for more light in this dark time.

Honoring Our Heritage Focused On Our Future

Debby Lewis started coming to Anshe Emet in 1986, but her daily involvement with the congregation really began in 1999 after the death of her mom, Lil Roth. At that time, she started coming to morning minyan to say Kaddish and essentially never left. She found her "Jewish voice" and the Hazzan Sheni at the time, Cantor Shelley Kaszynski, taught her how to leyn, chant haftarah, and lead the morning service. Debby was hired as the Anshe Emet Ritual Director in 2001 and remained in that role for 15 years. She continues to tutor Bar/Bat Mitzvah students and adults and to participate in services. Debby met her husband, Gabor, at morning minyan in December of 2001 and they were married in 2003. They have 4 grandchildren: Nellie, 9, and Leo, 7, in Berkeley, and Noah, 4, and Elliott, 1 1/2, in Salt Lake City. They travel often to visit the grandkids. Debby loved her life as the Ritual Director of Anshe Emet but equally loves retirement! She is most grateful for all the meaningful and loving relationships she made as a result of years in service to others.

The Friday night service at B'nai Emunah Synagogue in Skokie in the 1950s and early 1960s was thee big service of the weekend. It began at 8PM and the full choir would sing each week. I loved Cantor Stearns' beautiful voice and I loved the little hors d'oeuvres at the oneg afterward. So, when I found myself as a newly single mom in 1984 living in Lakeview, I decided to attend the Friday night service at the nearest Conservative synagogue to my apartment. I wanted to introduce a non-Jewish friend to the amazing Friday night service that I remembered from my youth, so we went to Anshe Emet on a Friday night in August 1984.

I was skeptical about the 6PM start time for the service but was even more surprised when we walked into the Malkov Chapel where there were—at most—15 people. Rabbi Siegel immediately walked up to us, introduced himself, and asked me if I was set for the High Holy Days. "How much are the tickets?" I asked. "Don't worry about that," he said. How could I not worry about that?? As a single mom, I had no discretionary money to spend! After the simple Friday night service (clearly NOT the service of my childhood!) Rabbi Siegel asked me to come into the office with him. He handed me two tickets for the High Holy Days. "I am going to give you these two tickets with the condition that you use them," he said. Use them? I was thrilled to be able to attend. When I sat in Blum on Rosh Hashanah and Cantor Silverman begin to sing, I started to cry. There was the sound and spirit of prayer that I remembered; I knew I had "come home" and found my synagogue. My subsequent involvement and life at Anshe Emet began with that simple act of hospitality and kindness by Rabbi Siegel and I will be forever grateful to him for reaching out to me.






Baby Beginnings • Thursdays 9:30AM-10:30AM

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Sam & Rebecca Tatel In honor of: RABBI BENJY'S FIRST HIGH HOLY DAYS WITH ANSHE EMET: Elliot & Elizabeth Darvick

My connection to Anshe Emet is beyond strong.

It is a part of my being that lives in my heart. The leaders, facility, structure, were part of the puzzle peices that formed my Jewish Identity. Anshe Emet Is fundamental to me and continues today with my extended family. It started when I was four years old. I had my first experience with art in a nursery school class. It was the early 40's. There were not many responsible choices for my full time working mother to find child care at that time. There was no Anshe Emet Day School. However, mother's oldest sister, my aunt Freida Goldman, was president of the Sisterhood and that just might have played a role. My going to Shabbat services was always a family gathering that included my folks, aunts, and grandma.

I still remember the first day I was brought to the Anshe Emet Nursery School. Four years old and we climed to the top floor. What a hike it seemed! The classroom had desks with attached seats. My father's old big shirt was a cumbersome smock that became a huge dress on me. My folks kept a very tidy house. I knew I was not supposed to make a mess. Having a sense of order was expected. My teacher put down a piece of "oilcloth" to cover the desk. That said to me that I was not to make a mess here either, and I was right at home with that order. With everything protected, I was given a piece of paper and some liquid paints. Finger Painting!! Oy, I was terrified of getting anything dirty. The teacher walked off and I dipped my tiny pointer finger tentatively and pushed some paint around slowly, and very carefully. When the teacher came back we had a chat. She told me finger painting was freedom. I could paint with my elbows if I wished! Astonished, I realized that Art was freedom. What an awakining! The paternal side of my household came from Germany. Maternal side came from Russia. They were quiet and reserved. It was a shanda to show any ego, let alone powerful expression. Art was a language I could pour out freely, and I had permission to do so! It has remained a passion from that moment on. I wish I knew that teacher's name. Bless Her!

This cover piece, The Rose, is about time. Photography has always been about time. Cartier Bresson said the photographic image holds a moment in time smaller than the eye can see. Now, in this modern age, we click the shutter and the basketball player jumping for a 3 pointer is held in mid air, defying gravity, while the ball, also in mid air, is on the way to the basket, but only part way there. That millisecond is held forever on the negative and in the photographic print. But, photography holds time in other ways too. Documentary photographers have held moments in history to be recorded and remembered. Great moments in history like wars, or the depression, historical happenings large and small. Families save important moments in their lives in the

snapshot records they keep. How does all that relate to this piece? Bresson was correct for his time. But does his meaning hold for today? Today, time is different. Everything is much faster. We live in a capitalistic society. No longer do we need pony express or snail mail to transfer funds across the country or world. Fortunes can be moved with a touch of a button. Business is pushed to a flurry of activity with immediate responses to queries via technological means. The world seems to be operating at lightning speed.

Growing up at Anshe Emet helped me to think and analyze as we studied Torah. I loved all the holidays, and especially Shabbat. I saw that our religion has an architecture of time structuring it. And yet, our Torah is timeless and everlasting. Today time is different, moving so fast. Perhaps I am drawn to photography as a means to hold on to all the moments, and not loose anything. I received my Masters Degree from IIT at the Institute of Design. Photography was a renown part of the school. I was mesmerized by the magic of the darkroom. The Rose, is a large scale piece, 41" x 32". In the flash of a vewier's moment you see a multitude of views of a small rose in different light and tones. Not only are different views given, but different lighting shown, a quiet emphasis on time. The film and print development both in color and black and white are hand done my me. I was painting with chemistry and temperature in the darkroom. Interesting to me that it takes so much time to visually discuss time.

The Rose is part of a larger series of grid pieces investigating these thoughts of much information given in a fast burst. An idea of time in our time of grabbing a multitude of information on a subject in a single moment in our age. I hope you enjoy it.
